Having recently turned the page on the calendar from December to January, I'm thinking of a Jewish family that did not exchange gifts at *Chanukah*, but rather on *Purim*. *Purim*, traditionally, teaches us about giving gifts—to each other and to the poor. In the Book of Esther, we read, "The Jews are to observe them as days of feasting and merrymaking and as an occasion for sending gifts to one another and

presents to the poor" (Esther 9:22). These two practices are known as: *mishloach* manot and matanot la'evyonim.

Mishloach manot involves sending gifts in the form of food to a friend. Jewish tradition teaches that one needs to give at least two different kinds of ready-to-eat food. It doesn't have to be fancy—a plastic zipper bag with hamantaschen and an apple is fine, though some choose to send elaborate fruit baskets. At Adath Emanu-El we have our mishloach manot fundraiser for our Religious School. Keep a lookout in the coming weeks for the emails and flyers as to how you can participate.

Another thought behind *mishloach manot* is to send these gifts to fellow Jews regardless of our religious or social differences. Haman, like similar enemies that came after him, did not differentiate between Jews of varying observances. When Jews unite, it makes us stronger.

The other gift giving *mitzvah*, *matanot la'evyonim*, teaches us to give *tzedakah* to the poor. In the Jewish tradition, we give money to enable others to enjoy the holiday. Jewish organizations such as the Jewish Federation of Southern NJ, the Jewish Family & Children's Service (JFCS), and the like can make this happen. And, in the tradition of Rabbi Hillel who taught, "If I am not for myself who will be for me? But if I am only for myself what am I?" we can also give *tzedakah* to any other people in need.

In addition to doing these above *mitzvot*, I hope you will also join in the *mitzvah* of hearing the story of Esther and *Purim* as we read from the *megillah*. This year we observe *Purim* 5786 on Monday, March 2, 2026. Please come at 7:00 pm for our service and *megillah* reading with satirical songs led by our Habonim Youth Choir. Come in costume—there will be prizes! A fun time will be had by all ages. In addition, we are bringing back the Adult Purim Shpiel on March 7, sharing the gift of humor.

It may feel early to think about Purim, but by the time the March/April bulletin arrives, the holiday will already be upon us. How might you offer gifts—of food, support, and kindness—to others this year?

Misheberach List Policy Update Effective January 1, 2026

Dear Friends,

One of the most sacred responsibilities we hold as a community is to pray for the healing of those who are ill. Our Misheberach list allows us to lift up the names of loved ones in need of physical, emotional, or spiritual healing. It is an honor to do so together every Shabbat.

In recent years, our list has grown very long and we have found that many names remain even after the need for healing has passed; sometimes because people simply forgot to notify us. In order to make sure that our prayers are focused and timely as possible, we will be updating our policy beginning January 1, 2026.

New Misheberach List Policy

- Names will remain on the Misheberach list for one month at a time.
 When you add a loved one to the Misheberach list, their name will automatically stay on for one month unless you request the name to be removed sooner.
- To keep a name on the list longer, please contact the office.
 If continued prayers are needed, we kindly ask that you call or email the office before the end of the month to keep your loved one on the list for the following month. (If special circumstances apply, please let us know as we are here to support you)
- If we do not hear from you, we understand that the name no longer needs to be on the list. This helps us to ensure that the list reflects those currently in need of prayer. You are always welcome to come to any service and say your loved one's name aloud.

We make this change with care, respect, and with the goal of honoring each name we recite. Thank you for helping us to keep our community's prayers meaningful and up to date.

Dear Adath Emanu-El Family,



As we step into the heart of winter, I want to be the first to wish you a "Happy New Year" and may 2026 be your best year yet! As we enter this new season together, I find myself thinking about what I appreciate most about this time of year. The honest answer is that winter teaches me the power of appreciation. These teens wake up early on Sunday mornings and volunteer their time to support the teachers and the students. They do small group instruction, comfort children who are upset, make copies, troubleshoot with teachers, get band-aids, take kids to the bathroom, decorate bulletin boards,

support complicated craft projects, provide individual support, and so much more. Not only do they complete these tasks, but they do so with a smile, manners, and confidence.

Three teens are serving as our Hebrew tutors. They never hesitate to ask questions and make suggestions to provide their students with the best possible educational experience. They also work well together, strategizing and implementing those strategies with their students.

Our office helpers are so enthusiastic this year! They do attendance, get kids for early dismissal, organize our snack baskets, distribute snacks to the students, set up toys for them to play with during break, and then clean it all up. It is a lot of work! Sometimes they even have extra tasks like stuffing Hanukkah goody bags. They recently discovered the joys of the coin counter machine! They love to be kept busy and to help out.

Occasionally, teachers need to be absent. I have realized that many madrichim feel comfortable taking control of their classrooms. They always accept this challenge with little hesitation and serve a very valuable role as substitutes in our school.

I know that the teens often do not want to help with menial tasks, but those menial tasks need to get done, and they do them willingly. I am the mother of two teens, so I know that there is something very special happening here at Adath Emanu-El that encourages our teens to behave this way here, when I am very confident that they do not ALWAYS act that way at home! But they ALWAYS act that way here.

I should also note that the groups of teens that we have at Teen Night on Wednesdays is also phenomenal. They are enthusiastic, pleasant, kind to one another, and happy to participate in the games and activities that make up our post B'nai Mitzvah program.

After all that we as a Jewish (and global) community have been through, it is easy to sometimes feel hopeless. When I look at our teens bustling around, looking for opportunities to serve as role models and make our school the absolute best it can be, it fills me with great hope for the future.

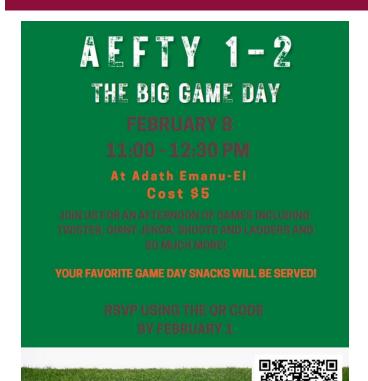

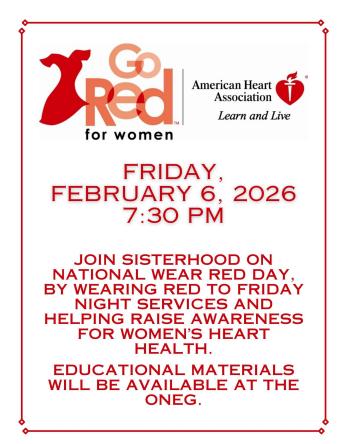

World Zionist Congress-Results

WHAT DID MY "VOTE FOR REFORM" DO FOR THE WORLD ZIONIST CONGRESS?



The following excerpt is written by Rabbi Lindsey Danziger, Director of Campaigns at the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism. It comes from her article that helps us better understand what our vote for Reform in the World Zionist Congress elections achieved. -Rabbi Amy L. Memis-Foler

(November 7, 2025) Last week in Jerusalem, the Reform Movement made history. We arrived at the World Zionist Congress (WZC) — a global gathering held every five years where Jewish communities from around the world come together to shape priorities and funding for the future of Israel and the Jewish people — and we made our presence known.

Thanks to the fearless leadership of ARZENU Co-Chairs Shoshana Dweck and Harry Levy, and ARZA Chair, Daryl Messinger, our Reform delegation was the largest at the Congress — and quickly became known as the most prepared. Throughout the week, Shoshana offered an image that became our motto: "When you come upon a bear in the wilderness, you don't run. You take a deep breath, make yourself as big and confident as possible, and convince the bear that you, too, are a bear."

And that's exactly what we did. We stood tall for our values — democracy, pluralism, inclusivity, and hope. We didn't back down. We built bridges across differences and proudly claimed our rightful place in the Zionist story. We came to win — and we did. This is what you worked and voted for!

World Zionist Congress-Results

Our Wins: Advancing Reform Jewish Values

The Congress was evenly split between right- and left-leaning parties — meaning nothing was guaranteed. But through smart organizing and coalition-building, our Reform Movement won the vast majority of votes, and not by small margins.

Here are just a few highlights:

- Stopped funding for new settlements in Gaza
- Won equal government protection for Reform and liberal synagogues in Israel
- Established a Commission of Inquiry to investigate the events of October 7
- Created a national mental health taskforce for victims of terror and soldiers
- Expanded youth movements and Israel education in the Diaspora
- ✓ Halted settlement expansion in E1, keeping open the path to a two-state solution
- Supported an equitable military draft for all Israelis
- Increased access to the egalitarian section of the Western Wall
- Strengthened civil society, pluralism, and support for Holocaust survivors

And we blocked proposals to:

- · Extend Israeli control over the Temple Mount and West Bank
- Use communal funds to support Christian Zionist groups

These victories show that our vision — a Jewish homeland rooted in peace, justice, and inclusion — speaks to the heart of global Jewry.

Our Delegation: Large, Diverse, and United

Our US delegation of 66 people (including a record number of observers and alternates) reflected the true diversity of our Movement and came together in unity with the World Union for Progressive Judaism and the Reform Delegates from around the world - over 150 people in total. ... We supported each other in long debates, stood up for our younger voices, and built real relationships — even with those who disagreed with us.

With Deep Gratitude

None of this could have happened without the heart of our Movement — YOU. Thank you for showing up, speaking out, organizing, and believing in our shared vision of a Jewish and democratic Israel. Your energy powered this success.

Social Action: Ways to Contribute in our Community

I do not routinely make New Year's resolutions. But 2026 feels anything but routine. There is an intensity in the air that makes me feel obligated to make some sort of resolution to be a better citizen. As Reform Jews, we practice Tikkun Olam, repairing the world. When we perform acts of Tikkun Olam, we exemplify our Jewish commitment to a better world and it gives power to our community. How can we better practice Tikkun Olam? * Start with inner work. Reflect on your personal beliefs and behaviors. Practice kindness and compassion every day. Practice courage. * Education yourself-Learn about the issues like climate change, economic inequality, voting rights, and antisemitism that impact us. * Show up for others. GREEN TEAM

News From the Green Team

With electricity charges soaring, here's somethings you can do to help lower your electric bill. "Energy vampires," or plugged-in items that aren't currently being used, make up about 23% of a home's electricity use, according to the Natural Resources Defense Council. Pressing the off button isn't always enough.

- 1. **SPACE HEATERS** You probably understand exactly why space heaters top the list of things to unplug when they're not in use—as space heaters are responsible for about 10,000 house fires per year, according to the <u>National Fire Protection Association</u>. Space heaters draw a *lot* of power when they are running, so plugging them on a power strip or extension cord increases the fire risk—and is a definite no-no. Space heaters may use more energy than the wattage recommended for that power strip, causing it to melt or short.
- 2. **TV's** TVs need to draw power so that they can be ready to go the second you click your remote. But the amount of energy that TVs use to be binge-watch-ready depends on the brand, with some using just 2 watts up to 54 watts, according to the NRDC.It may be worth pulling the plug—especially on TVs that aren't used on a daily basis.
- 3. **Video Game Consoles and Set-Top Boxes -** Set-top boxes were one of the biggest energy vampires in an <u>NRDC study</u>, and video game consoles also draw wattage when they're in sleep mode. If you have a smart TV, you may be able to bypass the set-top box altogether and connect to your streaming services and channels via the TV itself.
- 4. **Home Office Equipment -** That printer left on standby mode for those occasional printing jobs? It's using way more energy than is necessary—and that goes for the shredder, too. Unplug these items until you're ready to use them.
- 5. **Computers** Putting computers into sleep mode helps with energy usage, but your laptops and desktops are still drawing energy when they're plugged in and turned on. While you may not have to go through the trouble of unplugging it completely, shutting it down overnight or when you'll be away for an extended period of time can help you reduce your energy usage. A desktop computer, for example, can use between 1 to 49 watts of power when idle over a 24-hour period—which can add up to \$50 to your electric bill, according to the NRDC.

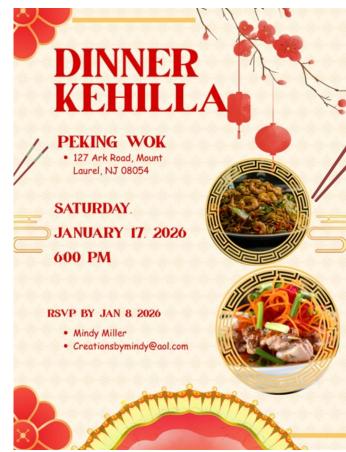
Bonus: Turning your computer completely off when you're not using it enables the RAM to clear, improving your computer's performance—and helps protect the delicate electronics from electrical surges.

Spotlight: Congregant Jessica Chasen



December 12-15, 2025 Washington DC

The Religious Action Center (RAC) of the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ) has been the hub of Jewish social justice work for more than 60 years. The work of the RAC is nonpartisan, focusing on working with elected officials from all parties to help shape our country by promoting and advocating for laws which reflect our Jewish morals and ethics, and striving to help our lawmakers to work together for the common good of everyone in our country.

The Consultation on Conscience is the RAC's flagship social justice gathering, convening activists, social justice leaders, clergy, and people who want to make a difference from across North America. Over four days in Washington, DC, those who attend learn, lead, and act together, culminating in a day of lobbying on Capital Hill with over 100 senators and congresspeople on behalf of the RAC's primary topics of the day.





This past December, our own congregant Jessica Chasen had the honor of attending this conference, representing both our Adath Emanu-El congregation as well as her hometown of Voorhees. The conference began with a Shabbat dinner and Friday evening service filled with 400+ Reform Jews from all over our country singing and praying together, highlighted by a d'var torah from Rabbi Rick Jacobs, president of the URJ, whose words and wisdom set the tone for the weekend as well as for the next year ahead. The weekend continued with organized activities, lectures, workshops, and more that were designed to inspire and engage them with the social justice work they were there to learn about and to give them the tools to bring these important topics back to their congregations.

On Monday December 15, 2025, over 200 attendees remained in DC to meet with over 110 different legislative offices of the Senate and House of Representatives to discuss and advocate on specific issues related to Israel, Immigration, Voting Rights and Healthcare acts that are currently being considered and which the RAC has put their support behind. Jessica had the honor of meeting with representatives of Senator Cory Booker and Congressman Donald Norcross. For Senator Booker's office there was a large group of RAC members from New Jersey, and Jessica was pleased to be asked to speak on the Jewish values related to immigration in their conversation that day. For Congressman Norcross, Jessica was surprised to find out that she would be the **only one** available to meet with his legislative assistant, and she was so proud to be trusted to speak one-on-one for 30 minutes on behalf of the RAC to encourage Congressman Norcross to consider co-sponsoring specific acts supported by the RAC in relation to Israel (West Bank Violence Prevention Act) and Immigration (Protecting Sensitive Locations Act), and to thank him for already co-sponsoring and showing his support for the John R. Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act of 2025.

Jessica has had the pleasure of attending many RAC, URJ and WRJ conferences and events over the years, but this is the first year she has expanded her experience to include lobbying on Capitol Hill. For those who may be interested, Jessica encourages you to save the date to join her at the next URJ Biennial Conference (a huge gathering of Reform Jews from all over the US held every 2 years) to be held LOCALLY in PHILADELPHIA, PA from December 10 to 13, 2026.

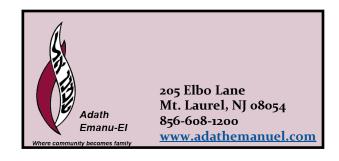
